Finally, all that is left for me to do in this last article of 2022 is to wish you all a very Happy Cristmas and a great growing, gardening and enjoying time in 2023








Harthill Reservoir Upgrade -Latest News - Community Drop in Event

HARTHILL'S HERO OF THE BATTLE OF JUTLAND LEADING SEAMAN JAMES HORACE WAINSCOAT CGM (1892 - 1916)

Laid to rest in Harthill graveyard in 1916 was a hero of the Battle of Jutland, the largest sea battle of WW1 involving 250 British and German ships and approximately 100,000 men. It took place over two days from 31st May - 1st June 1916.

Leading Seaman, James Horace Wainscoat of the Royal Navy was born in Harthill and stood over 6ft tall.

James joined the Royal Navy on 7th June 1909 as a 16-year-old boy and saw service on HMS Ganges (Shore Establishment), HMS Caesar, HMS Illustrious, HMS Prince of Wales, HMS Excellent, HMS Victory and HMS Southampton.

In 1911, aged just 17, James was awarded a bronze 'Sea Gallantry Medal' by the Board of Trade. It was presented to him at Buckingham Palace by King George V for 'rendering meritorious service at the wreck of the SS Delhi'. The Delhi had run aground at night off the coast of Morocco during heavy seas and James was part of a group of seamen from HMS Prince of Wales that attempted to rescue the passengers.

Passengers onboard the Delhi included Alexander Duff, 1st Duke of Fife, his wife the Princess Royal, Princess Louise of Wales and their daughter's, Princess Alexandra and Princess Maud, who were taken to the shore soaking wet and bare footed by the seamen after their lifeboat capsized.

The Princess Royal carried away a small case containing her jewels and tiara but lost it when the lifeboat overturned. Princess Alexandra was struck on the head by an oar, but was held above water until some seamen waded into the water to rescue her.

World War 1

In 1916 at the age of 23 James was a Leading Seaman serving on board HMS Southampton and took part in the largest sea battle of WW1.

During the ferocious Battle of Jutland, James was a Gun Layer on HMS Southampton. He was instructed to find the range of the German ship, 'Frauenlob' at night which the Southampton had already hit with a torpedo. The report says..

"Leading Seaman Wainscoat laid his gun so accurately that with the first round from it he plumped a shell right into one of the German destroyers, cutting her in two."

As the 'Frauenlob' sank in flames in the darkness HMS Southampton came under attack from six German cruisers and was very badly hit. Covered in smoke and flames from the German guns it looked like HMS Southampton would sink. Numerous men onboard were killed or badly burned. The gun turret where Leading Seaman James Wainscoat was located during the battle was also hit. The report says...

"I am sorry to say that later in the action, Wainscoat was mortally injured. The Gunner was heard to say, 'thank God I did for one of them' - referring of course to his destroyer he had sunk with his first shot. This remark was made when he was suffering much pain through his injuries."

For some unknown reason, the German ships did not finish the Southampton off and sink it, probably thinking it would sink due to the damage they had inflicted on it. James was mortally wounded and after the battle was later transferred to the hospital ship Plassey where he died a week later of his injuries. The report makes mention of him.

"We also buried some wounded who had died of their wounds, one poor chap had just died today in the hospital ship after surviving a week, he was one of the frightfully burnt cases".

that he joined the Royal Navy.

On James' Commonwealth War Graves headstone in Harthill churchyard, it has the initials CGM after his surname suggesting that James was awarded the Conspicuous Gallantry Medal. The CGM is awarded for gallantry in action for petty officers and seamen of the Royal Navy.

I presume it was awarded posthumously for his part in the sinking of the German ship 'Frauenlob' although there is no mention of the award on James' service record. I was also unable to find James' name in the list of CGM recipients which is a bit of a mystery for this heroic young man from Harthill.

Harthill & Anston observe a minute's silence

Winning Bassetlaw League Division 1 has been a two-horse race throughout the 2022 season between Harthill & Welbeck.

Having beaten Welbeck away in the 1st game of the season, both teams embarked on long winning runs until Harthill faltered with back-to-back defeats against Farnsfield & Blidworth, which meant we moved into 2nd place.

Both teams then matched each other's results until the penultimate game of the season when we hosted Welbeck at Thorpe Road.

Harthill emerged victorious from this game, claiming 20 points, but Welbeck earned sufficient bonus points. meaning we both now had exactly the same points. Crucially, Welbeck had a better net run rate than Harthill and therefore still led the table. (Net Run Rate is crickets equivalent of goal difference in football).

Moving into the final weekend of the season on 17th September, based on their hugely successful seasons, both teams were expected to emerge victorious from their games. with Harthill travelling to mid-table Anston and Welbeck hosting third placed Kiveton Park.

Unusually, the Welbeck game started 90 mins before the Harthill game so they could attend an end of season function. Prior to the game at Anston, an impeccable minute's silence was observed following the sad death of Queen Elizabeth 11, and both teams sported black arm bands as a mark of respect.

Batting first, Anston scored 199 for 6, with the wickets shared between Dom Cumming (2), Chris Page (1), Matt Plant (1) & Chris Hopkinson (1) plus a run out. Harthill's cause wasn't helped by your author dropping a catch at "cow corner" off an Anston batsman who went on to score 50 not out.

Meanwhile, in the Welbeck game, Kiveton batted 1st and scored a competitive, but slightly below par, 180 for 9.

Due to injury, Harthill's regular opening batsman, Andrew Collinson had to miss the game therefore Danny Antony opened with Phil Higginson and they put on an excellent opening stand of 124 for the first wicket before Phil was out for 39.

Throughout the game at Anston, more away fans from Harthill were making an appearance and keeping us up to date with the Welbeck run chase, as most games are now scored live on-line.

It was going to be very close and as Welbeck's required runs per over grew and they lost wickets with increasing regularity, it became clear that our near-neighbours had pulled off the win..... all Harthill needed to do was complete our own victory.

The dismissal of Phil Higginson was quickly followed by that of our star batsman Dom Cumming for 2 runs, followed by Dan Whitehouse (12). Tensions were starting to rise amongst the Harthill faithful, but Danny Anthony was still going strong and duly completed his first century of the season in this most critical of fixtures.

When he was finally out for a magnificent 124 Harthill only needed 11 runs to win. Despite losing Jack Mason for a duck, Bradie Shaw 2 not out and captain Chris Page 6 not out saw us to a famous victory with Chris fittingly hitting the winning runs.

This victory meant HARTHILL ARE DIVISION 1 CHAMPIONS and the celebrations went on long into the night back at our home ground with Dan Whitehouse leading proceedings by playing guitar to a far higher standard than the lads singing!

The 2022 season where we won 19 out of 22 matches will go down in Harthill CC folklore as one of the greatest ever in our 124 years history and we are all really looking forwards to the league presentation night on 19th November where we will receive the league trophy and our own presentation night at The Beehive on 3rd December (7 pm).

I'd like to thank everyone who played a role in our success, all the players, our growing band of supporters, scorer Oliver Bentley and groundsman Alan Page.
