- All flowers/pot plants should be grown by the exhibitor from seed, cutting, bulb or plug. No entry should be bought flowers or pot plants. The only exception is for flowers entered in the Floral Art Sections as the Art is the basis for judging, not the

#### Victoria Sandwich Recipe

#### Ingredients

110g Butter or Margarine, 110g Caster sugar, 2 Eggs, 110g Self-Raising flour (sieved)

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 170C/160C Fan/Gas 3
- 2. Cream fat and sugar together, beat in the eggs one at a time adding a little of the sieved flour with the second
- 3. Gently fold in the remaining flour with a metal spoon
- 4. Turn the mixture into lined cake tins (one 7" or two 6")
- 5. Cook in the middle of the oven for 35 mins (7") or 25 mins (2x 6")
- 6. Cool on a wire tray and sandwich with jam or with jam and cream
- 7. Dredge the top with icing sugar



#### Fatless Sponge Recipe 2 **Ingredients**

3 Eggs, 75g Caster Sugar, 75g Self-Raising flour

#### Method

- Pre-heat oven to 170C/Fan 150C/Gas 5 Line 7" baking tin with paper
- Using an electric whisk, whisk together eggs and sugar until it has tripled in size and is stiff (test by using the whisk to make a line on top of the mixture - if it stays, it is ready)
- Carefully fold in the flour and pour the mixture into the tin. Cook for 10 mins
- Once cool remove from the tin


Despite the weather god's not shining down on us this year, the community certainly did not let us down, and it was great to see so many people supporting the Carnival and Show once again.





The first burials in the "New" Churchyard took place in 1983. Although the "Old" Churchyard is occasionally still used to access family graves, most burials since that time have taken place in the New Churchyard. Access is from Thorpe Road or through a gateway on the East side of the Old Churchyard. In a central place in the New Churchyard lies a circular area enclosed by a hedge. This is a designated area for burying ashes after cremation. As an alternative, ashes are sometimes buried within a loved one's grave.

It can be difficult to locate a grave and to make this easier, there is now a folder containing a plan of the New Churchyard giving an alphabetical list of those buried and a key to the site of the individual graves. Not all graves have memorial stones. Additionally, there is a plan for the Cremation area in the New Churchyard and one for the Cremation area in the Old Churchyard alongside Union Street, close to its junction with Church Lane. Each area has an alphabetical list.

The Old Churchyard has graves dating back several hundred years. Many of the gravestones are hard to read but in the 1980s a plan was made and can be located on www.genuki.org.uk Search for Harthill churchyard and you will find a numbered plan plus a list of all the graves which took place up to the date of their survey which coincided with the start of the New Churchyard as a burial area. There is also a wonderful list of all the inscriptions on the gravestones that were legible at the time.








Old Churchyard







#### HARTHILL'S MEMORIAL CROSS

DEDICATED BY THE BISHOP OF SHEFFIELD 15th August 1920 - HONOURING THE FALLEN

The Harthill War Memorial Cross stands on the grass plot to the north of the rectory gates, and the names of the fallen are inscribed on a tablet fixed to the rear wall.

The work is mounted on an octagonal plinth and is sculpted in Portland stone. The design is that of Mr. J. D. Webster, Architect, of Sheffield, and the sculptors were Messrs. Tory and Sons, also of Sheffield. The memorial cross is edged with a limestone boundary wall surmounted by cast iron railings. The enclosure is paved with limestone paving slabs.

The total cost of the cross amounted to approximately £350 and was met by public subscriptions.

At the ceremony on the 15th August 1920, Mr Cass. W. Smith, on behalf of the memorial committee and the parish, handed over the cross to the care of the Kiveton Park Urban District Council, requesting that the District Council keep the memorial in all due sacredness and honour.

Councillor Brady on behalf of the District Council accepted the care of the cross, and at the time stated that it was not only the present Council under whose care it would rest, but also those of the future, as it would ever stand to the memory of those names it honoured. RMBC now have responsibility for maintaining the War Memorial.

There are two tablets formed from a mixture of white marble and limestone mounted to the rear wall of the memorial.

The first tablet measures 50.8 cm wide  $\times 60.96 \text{ cm}$  high, and reads:

To the glory of God and in honoured memory of the Harthill men who laid down their lives in The Great War 1914-1919.

This cross was dedicated by their fellow parishioners

#### **Road Closures**

Much has been posted on social media regarding Northern Powergrid (NPG) and the work to provide high power electricity cables through the village to Woodall Services, which is currently taking place.



Many of the comments are quite justified, some of them misinformation, some ill-informed, and some simply insulting, both to the Parish Council and Parish Councillors.

The Parish Council was first approached by NPG for permission to go across Spens Field with power cables, as part of work to be able to install high speed charging points for electric vehicles at Woodall Services, in line with Government strategy. The original plans that were put to us involved coming down Jackys Lane and across Spens Field, to try to alleviate some of the disruption for the works on Union Street and Woodall Lane. As the Parish Council holds a long lease on Spens Field, NPG sought our permission.

Requesting permission was a courtesy. It soon became clear in our discussions that, as a utility company, NPG has statutory powers to do anything that they believe is necessary to maintain the electrical infrastructure. They are not required to consult, and current government statute (unlike water authorities) does not require them to compensate. Council gave 'permission' for Spens Field to be used, and up to the end of April this year that is what Council understood to be happening and was awaiting more detailed information on timings etc.

Once the plans were communicated, which showed that using Jackys Lane and Spens Field had been resolved to be unviable by NPG, it was clear that the Parish would be facing major disruption and that the Parish Council nor RMBC were in a position to refuse it. RMBC had already done a lot of work to look at how road closures could work. Whilst very concerned the Parish Council felt that it was important to establish good lines of communication with NPG so that as a minimum, issues could be hi-lighted and hopefully resolved as they arose during the works. NPG did agree to our request to implement the one-way system on Packman Lane and Manor Road, they did hold a meeting at the village hall to talk to parishioners, and they did attend Harthill Carnival to take questions. They also sent letters to all parishioners.

These were all things that the Parish Councillors, working with Ward Councillors and RMBC, requested once it became aware of the works in their current format. All was done to try to communicate as much information as was available to help people in the parish prepare for the upheaval.

The Parish Council pressed NPG over some sort of compensation, particularly for small businesses, but this would appear to be an issue that only government statute can solve, to bring Electricity companies in line with Water Authorities.

However, after some research and further questions, Council was successful in gaining access to their Community Partnering Funding scheme to provide funding (not compensation) towards some kind of physical play addition that would benefit the community.

Whilst no-one welcomes the timing or the disruption of this work, the new cabling is very high capacity and more than will be required at Woodall Services. It is our understanding that when the work is completed, subject to planning permission for a new sub-station, the village network will eventually be connected to make use of the spare capacity. This should help reduce the number of power outages that we seem to suffer and help power the new vehicle charging stations in the village which will be required if government targets are to be met. Charging stations are already featuring as conditions in new planning applications.

As a Parish Council, we do appreciate what the local businesses do for our community and sincerely hope that they come through all of this. There will be some increase in trade from workmen in the village, however both now, and after the works, it is important to support our local shops if we want them to remain. We have checked that signage will be in place to ensure that customers are aware that the shops are open and with the one-way system the detour by car is no more than 10 minutes. We have done what we can to help.

Everyone wants a transition to a greener planet and sometimes this comes with some pain. The move to electric vehicles is pointless if there is no infrastructure to support them.

Harthill with Woodall Parish now has four defibrillators





#### Canal & River Trust


Harthill Project Update - as of 22nd August 2023

Canal & River Trust recently ran a public consultation on the proposal to build 15 stepped fishing platforms around the reservoir which closed on 5th August. As this proposal was not included in the original planning application, the Trust will need to submit a variation to that planning application before work can take place. To publicise this consultation, the Trust sent a letter to all households in Harthill and Woodall to ask for their feedback on these proposals, as well as contacting the local MP, councillors and other groups who use the reservoir, and encouraging groups to share the consultation via social media. The Trust is currently reviewing all of the feedback and comments received to inform the variation request, which will be submitted in late September 23.

The project team have completed the work to cut through the embankment, although due to rock levels being lower than expected the excavation work has taken longer than planned. Construction work on the spillway is now progressing, and works are expected to be complete in early 2024.

The archaeology report has been published and is available on the Trust's website. Archaeological surveys were carried out in 2022 by South Yorkshire Archaeological Service (SYAS) to look for any buried archaeological features on the reservoir site. In total, 16 small shards of pottery were found. It is thought that the shards belong to 14 separate pieces of pottery such as jars, dishes and bowls. The archaeologists estimate that some of these findings date back as far as the 13th and 14th centuries, with others dating back to the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries. In addition to the shards of pottery, two tiny fragments of a clay tobacco pipe dating back to the 17th or 18th century were discovered, along with a 16th or 17th century copper alloy buckle and a small iron nail of undetermined age. The collection of pottery will be archived in Clifton Park Museum.

The 2023 cricket season has been very stop-start with the fixtures being decimated by the weather. Out of 18 games for the 1st team, 6 have been cancelled without a ball being bowled and one was abandoned part way through.

Having won the league last season, we are now in relegation fight, not helped by us missing games against lower placed teams that we needed to win.

As it stands, with 4 games left to play we are currently 4th bottom and "safe" but two teams and potentially three get relegated.

Once the season started, in what should have been the 4th game, we were unlucky to lose by just 6 runs to Worksop and this was followed by another 6-run defeat to Whitwell.

The 1st win of the season was recorded on 10th June at home to Farnsfield where Harthill scored 195/9 (Dom Cumming 88) and won by 14 runs with Chris Page the pick of the bowlers with 4 for 27 off 10 overs. This was followed up by a 6 wicket win against Ordsall Bridon, with Dom taking 4 for 27 and scoring 65 with the bat.

In one of the most remarkable games of local cricket you will ever see, we tied at home with North Wheatley. We scored a very good 245 for 7 with Bradie Shaw hitting 77 off 66 balls and had Wheatley in masses of trouble at 20 for 4 and 118 for 8. Unfortunately, they managed to put on an unbeaten 97 for the final wicket and tie the game with a 4 off of the final ball of the match. Jack Mason was the pick of the Harthill bowlers with 5 for 26.

Highlights of this game are available on You Tube! Retford were beaten away by 100 runs with Dom scoring 124 not out and Reece van Staden 81 as Harthill piled up 289 for 5, followed by a victory in our last game beating Ordsall Bridon away by 28 runs, with Bradie Shaw bowling at express pace to take 3 for 35.

The second team are having an excellent season and have all but secured third place in Division 5. In a tense, rain-affected game against Mansfield Hosiery Mills, Harthill needed to score 110 from 33 overs. After a 50-run opening partnership, the wheels came off and Harthill were needing 5 to win in the final over, after a single, Chris Woodward was on strike and promptly hit the 2nd ball for six to secure victory. This was followed by a 94-run victory against Sherwood with Ian Batty (68) & Andrew Collinson (59) sharing an opening stand of 131 and Chris Woodward claiming 5 for 26.

In a remarkable debut for the club, Chris Radford scored 160 ably supported by Chris Woodward with 61 in an 89-run victory at Welbeck.

Leading run scorers for the 2nd team are Andrew Collinson and Martin Grayson both with 291 and the leading wicket taker is Chris Woodward with 16 followed by Archie Plant with 13.
