With Easter now behind us, the village is looking full of spring colour and thoughts turn to the forthcoming Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III.

Our community groups have various events and activities planned around the Coronation weekend and beyond, to celebrate this historical event. We have tried to include a little history in this issue, as well as information on how you can join in these events.

If you happen to walk on Spens Field, you will hopefully notice the small English Oak Tree that has been planted. The Parish Council wanted to commemorate the Coronation with something that will last for many years. A plaque will be added, to tell parishioners of the future, how the tree came to be there.

Additionally, to mark the occasion, the Parish Council has had commemorative wooden medallions made for children attending our Parish School. These are intended as a keepsake, and whilst they could be kept in a child's memory box, the decorative loop will allow it to be hung on a hook in the bedroom, or for those that have special memory baubles at Christmas, children could even hang it on the Christmas tree.

The Parish Council has also purchased the craft supplies and other items to help with the Coronation celebration to be held on Saturday 24th June. Please see page 12 for details of the timing of activities, it sounds like a great event.

Coronations witnessed by Harthill Church

The village church has stood on its mound since 1085 when the William de Warenne had it built there. When it was first built, the church was dedicated to St John the Baptist. However, after the reformation in 1600 the church was re-dedicated as All Hallows, (All Saints).

10 Facts about the Coronation

Some facts below that may be of interest.

King Charles III will be the 40th monarch to be crowned in Westminster Abbey on 6th May 2023, in a ceremony going back over a thousand years.

History says that William the Conqueror was the first monarch to be crowned in Westminster Abbey on 25th December 1066, although it is believed that King Harold had himself crowned King of England there on 6th January 1066, the day after King Edward the Confessor's death.

Before Westminster Abbey was built, monarchs had been crowned at various places including Bath Abbey and Winchester Cathedral.

Two King Edward's were never crowned. They were King Edward V and King Edward VIII. Edward V was presumed murdered in the Tower of London before he could be crowned, allegedly on the orders of the Duke of York, who later became the infamous King Richard III. King Edward VIII abdicated 11 months after succeeding his father King George V, before the date set for his coronation, to marry the American divorcee Mrs Simpson.

King William III and Queen Mary III are the only joint monarchs to have been crowned in 1689, following the Glorious Revolution of 1688 that led to the last Catholic King of England, James II of England and VII of Scotland, being deposed for the Protestant King William of Orange in a coup d'état, led by a number of English aristocrats including the 1st Duke of Leeds, who lies at rest in his family vault in Harthill Church.

Queen Elizabeth II's Coronation was the most widely viewed coronation in history, with millions of viewers all around the world watching the ceremony on TV.

The Coronation Chair was ordered to be made by King Edward I around 1300 to enclose the Stone of Scone, after it was seized by King Edward's forces following the English invasion of Scotland in 1296.

The Stone of Scone had been used for centuries in the coronation of Scottish monarchs at Scone Abbey in Perthshire. In 1996, the British Government returned the stone to Scotland. It is kept in Edinburgh Castle with the Scottish Crown Jewels but will be returned to Westminster Abbey and placed in the Coronation Chair for King Charles' Coronation in May.

Twenty-eight Queen Consorts have been crowned in Westminster Abbey over the last thousand years.

The first queen consort to be crowned in Westminster Abbey was Matilda of Flanders in 1086, the wife of William the Conqueror. Since then, a further twenty-seven Queen Consorts have had coronations there, although some consorts never had a coronation.

In the year that King Charles III is crowned King, All Hallows Church has a direct link back to the previous King Charles II, that has been hidden in plain sight for 361 years.



Harthill Church has had on display the Royal coat of arms belonging to King Charles II since 1662. It was repurposed at a later date and altered for King George II in 1730. However, the coat of arms is actually those of King Charles II and not King George II. The date 1662 (probably) has been overpainted with 1730, and the initial C has been changed to a G. However the date can still be clearly seen and to prove its origin back to King Charles II, written in the 1586 -1697 Parish Register is written the following note.

"Memorandum. Upon the twentieth day of June the King's Armes was set in this our parish church of Harthill in the year 1662. John Barke & John Simonet was then Church Wardens."

Finally, Sunshine! It was so good to have some relief this week from the rain. The spring flowers and bulbs seem to have sprung up almost overnight, reminding us of all we love about growing and gardening.

So, we are looking forward again to another year with some changes in the HDGA calendar of events.

Sadly, for all sorts of reasons, we only managed to get a few gardens to join the Village Garden Trail planned to be held on Saturday June 24th, so this was not able to go ahead. However, All Hallows Church and Harthill Primary School will each be organising their own Coronation Celebration Event on that date, details are enclosed later in The Hart see page 12. We are sad that we are not able to join them as we usually do as part of Garden Trail, but are very excited to see what they will be doing.

Another big change for us is that the Annual 3 Day Fruit Flower and Vegetable Show will not be held again in this format. Instead it will be replaced by a 1 day

event that will be held on SUNDAY 17th SEPTEMBER IN THE VILLAGE HALL. It has significant changes in that we will no longer have the RHS approved judges considering the Chrysanthemums, Dahlias and vegetables as we have before. This will be a simpler event with local judging and simpler entries. We are calling this event 'Make, Grow and Show' and there will be classes for needlework, flowers and domestic and children, different in requirement and type from what we have largely done in the past. We are getting all the details together and planning in place, we will put more information out within the next few weeks. We hope you will enjoy and support this new change.

We have recently had a very successful and enjoyable Easter Wreath session in the Village Hall and these Workshops are proving so very successful - entirely led by Marcella and her great band of helpers. It is planned that we again hold our Christmas Flowers workshops in early December with an increased availability. More details of these in due course.

It will be a busy year all around and hopefully loads of good growing weather and great growing in Harthill and the surrounding community.

Update on Harthill Reservoir project

Works are continuing at Harthill Reservoir on the spillway upgrade project, with the base of the new spillway now being laid. The original primary spillway is being regrouted to protect and conserve the historic feature. Archaeological investigation and heritage recording has now taken place, and the Trust are making plans to share the results with the local community over the summer months. The main construction phase is still on track to be complete by the end of winter 2023. We will resurface the footpath across the dam and reinstate the memorial benches during the final phase of the project.

Platinum Jubilee Corner - New Tots Play Area Official Opening 22nd March 2023

On 22nd March 2023, Harthill with Woodall Parish Council, with the help of local school pupils, officially opened its new Tots Play Area, 'Platinum Jubilee Corner'. Councillor Joy Pattison made a short statement to thank everyone involved in making the project possible, and pupils in Foundation Stage 2, from Harthill Primary School, enthusiastically cut the ribbon to open the new play area. This was followed by much fun testing out the new play equipment.

During 2022, Harthill with Woodall Parish Council was delighted to learn that it had been successful in obtaining £50,000 in funding towards a new tots play area for Spens Field, Woodall Lane, Harthill.

This new area, for the youngest parishioners, now sits above the existing play area and is fully enclosed to allow tots to play safely, using most of the equipment unaided, dependant on their age and ability. It is a great addition to the existing play offering and provides opportunities for parents and carers to socialise whilst children play. It is important to remember that these young people have spent most of their early life in the pandemic and this is a real opportunity for them to play and mix with children of their own age.

The play area was built to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, hence its name 'Platinum Jubilee Corner'. Her sad passing, late last year, makes this project even more special.

The Parish Council has contributed to the project with funding received as Community Infrastructure Levy on new housing in the Parish, but acknowledge this project would not have been possible without the funding from Veolia Environmental Trust - @veoliaenvtrust. This support is gratefully appreciated. Veolia Environmental Trust is a registered charity that awards grants for community projects through the Landfill Communities Fund.

Harthill with Woodall Parish Council would also like to thank Ward Councillors: Dominic Beck and Marnie Havard for their £5,000.00 contribution towards this project.

As part of this project the Parish Council purchased 1000 Daffodil, Snow Drop and Bluebell bulbs which have been planted on Spens Field, thank you to all who turned out to plant them. Particular thanks to Ward Councillor Marnie Havard and Councillor Paul Rowland - there were a lot of bulbs!

Additionally, to encourage Wildlife and birds, Harthill Workbench have made some bird and bat boxes, which the school children will be signing. Thank you to Harthill Workbench and the school children for their contribution. This has been a real community activity, from the initial community feedback, the planning, and the work to bring it to fruition. All Councillors gave their time voluntarily. It shows what can be achieved when a community work together.

More Defibrillators are coming to Harthill and Woodall South Yorkshire's

Great News! Harthill with Woodall Parish Council has secured a

grant for further defibrillators in the Parish.

Currently Harthill with Woodall Parish has one defibrillator situated on the Wall outside the doctor's surgery.

Thanks to funding from South Yorkshire Community Foundation, through the Loscar Wind Farm Fund, three more defibrillators will be available in the Parish by the end of May.

These will be located on the wall of the Beehive pub, the wall next to the noticeboard in Woodall and the Village Hall on Winney Hill. Yorkshire Ambulance Services recommend a range of no more than 600 meters. With construction at both end of the village this will maximise the coverage for residents of the Parish.

Litter & Fly Tipping

Spring and summer are on the way and the countryside will start to look its best. What a shame it should be spoiled with something we could all do something about.

During the last few months there seems to be a great deal of litter and fly tipping in the country lanes around Harthill and Woodall. Please don't throw things out of car windows, take fast food containers, plastic bottles, and cans home with you. If you take a drink with you while out jogging or walking, please take the empty plastic container home with you.

If you see any fly tipping, please report it to RMBC on 0 1 7 0 9 3 8 2 1 2 1 or report it online at https://www.rotherham.gov.uk/xfp/form/1096 Generally, Rotherham are soon out to clear it away.

When doing D.I.Y, take the rubbish to the dumpsite in our area. There is one very close to us, it is situated between Todwick and Dinnington. It is near the industrial estate, from Todwick Road, turn onto Common Road. The waste site is at the junction of Common Road and Houghton Road. Opening times are: Winter 10 am to 4.30 pm, Summer 10 am to 6.30 pm They are now open seven days a week.

We should all take responsibility for the upkeep of the countryside around us.

The Parish Council would like to thank all the volunteers who take the time to pick up litter while out walking, it makes a tremendous difference to our village lanes if we can keep them clear.
