

Did you know that Ed Clancy OBE is the Active Travel Commissioner for South Yorkshire and a cycling ambassador for our region?

Ed Clancy is a three-time Olympic cycling champion, six-time world champion, and one of the most successful endurance riders in the country. He's also an ambassador for British Cycling.

Ed Clancy's mission is to encourage people to walk, cycle, or wheel more by making it fun and providing the right environment. He's also working to improve the region's cycling and walking networks.



Harthill Active Travel met and cycled with Ed Clancy this summer and we are looking forward to hosting him in Harthill this month to show him the sites for safe walking, wheeling and cycling paths on Hard Lane and Woodall Lane that this group is lobbying for.

If you have not seen or signed our petition it is available in Harthill Fruit and Veg shop, in Salon 69 and will shortly be available electronically. RMBC is aware of and supportive of our campaign but there is no current local funding to upgrade the two routes. We need 600 signatures to guarantee having our case considered by a RMBC planning subcommittee and to support applications to other funding bodies. Come along and join in this season's Thursday night sessions of singing and playing of the 'Old Yorkshire Carols' in the upstairs room at The Beehive.

This custom began in Harthill in the 1970's when the late Dr. Derek McCloughlan intoduced this Yorkshire tradition to the Beehive, supported by members of the Harthill & District Choral Society, the Harthill Morris and others interested in learning these 'Local' carols. Some pre-date those listed in the Ancient & Modern hymn book, with titles such as 'Old Foster', 'Jacob's Well' and 'Star of Bethlehem'. Many are sung with great gusto, especially when accompanied by a pint or two!

The Beehive sings, in common with other pubs in South Yorkshire, commence the week following Remembrance Sunday.

So, this year we started on Thursday 14th November and will be continuing weekly at 8.45 pm until Thursday 19th December. If you don't know the carols when we start, you should be familiar with them by Christmas. Words are provided and the singing is accompanied by an enthusiastic band of musicians. Attendance is Free.

So come along and enjoy singing these lovely carols with a very friendly group.

Three of the units are available thanks to funding from South Yorkshire Community Foundation, through the Loscar Wind Fund. The Parish Council would also like to thank the owner/occupiers of the locations for accommodating the units.

Play Area Consultation

A big thankyou to everyone that has filled in the play area consultation - this gives us lots of feedback on what parishioners would like to see in the play area.

Harthill with Woodall Parish Council is now looking at this to devise a five-year plan to swap out certain equipment and replace it. Some of this will be funding dependant so we can't give timescales on this as yet.

The large Teen shelter will be coming down as it has a number of issues that cannot be fixed. Popular amongst voters was the Hoop shelter with some kind of climbing item close by. Currently the climbing net is favourite by a small margin. This will be built into our plans.

In the main play area two climbing frames were popular - both with longer slides. New equipment is always being designed and produced so we will keep this in mind when we have the opportunity to make some changes in that area.

The first item on the list to change is the small roundabout which is to be exchanged for a more inclusive model on better surfacing. Council will be seeking funding for installation in 2025

The Cableway and Tots play area are proving hugely popular and we will be responding to requests for more seating/picnic tables. It is proving a really popular venue for families when the weather permits and that is great to see.

Harthill Project Update - November 2024

We are pleased to confirm that the public footpath reopened on Friday 1st November and we are starting to gradually refill the reservoir over the forthcoming months.

Landscaping around the reservoir will begin later this month. Approx. 100 new trees will be planted along with new hedgerows to be added along the timber fencing, as part of our commitment to help to increase biodiversity in the area.

While our charity had originally hoped to include new fishing platforms within this project, this has not been possible within the existing project budget. However, we have secured planning permission for the fishing platforms (valid for two years) and are looking into opportunities to try to support these.

In the spring/summer issue of The Hart we told Parishioners that our Parish had been invited to take part in the new Yorkshire Rose Award Scheme. As part of the 60th anniversary of the National Britain in Bloom campaign, Yorkshire in Bloom launched a new simple accreditation scheme for local communities. They have gone back to the original campaign, launched in 1964, where Towns and Villages were rewarded for their local pride with three basic threads, Horticultural Impact, Cleanliness, and Provision of Public Amenities. Assessment was in the form of Yorkshire Rose awards 1-5, five being the highest.

In September we got our results and are delighted to announce that the Parish had gained the top award of '5 Roses' and was the South Yorkshire winner.

The judges' comments were as follows:

- 1. Street Scene and public areas were spotless, even stopped a litter picker out and about on the day of judging. Seasonal hanging baskets, wall boxes, planters added a splash of colour throughout the village.
- 2. Good use of sustainable planting in areas around the war memorial, main street and Doctor Lane. Public areas around the village hall, church yard, public houses and shops were well maintained and welcoming.
- 3. Allotments were well maintained and full of produce. The recreational ground and pond (when fully open) are real assets to the village.
- 4. The wildflower meadow along the verge of the main road into the village was spectacular.

The Parish Council are delighted with the results and would like to thank all who contributed.

We have recently been busy liaising with the Council, the Canals and Rivers Trust and other agencies about the reopening of the reservoir. Like many of you, we are delighted the public amenity has been reopened for the benefit of local people. We are hoping the condition of some of the footpaths will also be improved in the near future too and we are working hard to bring this about. Oh, and we could do with the water back!

On other matters, Rotherham Council has recently consulted with effected residents about proposed new double-yellows around some junctions in the village and around the Beehive Pub. This should make the village safer for all and strike the correct balance between the need to park and pedestrian and driver safety.

Coupled to this, the new speed humps promised for Hard Lane, Thorpe Road and Woodall are still due to be installed. We are just awaiting a date.

The idea of bringing Soup and Song to Wales Kiveton Methodist Church for our local communities was first conceived when visiting a similar themed event 3 years ago up in Ayr, which is called Musical Melodies.

After several visits there, it was abundantly clear that listening to music, and singing along to the old songs and tunes, brought such a joy and pleasure to those present. This was obvious by the smiles and reactions from everyone there. The Ayr events are now into their 11th year, so it's continued success is very much deserved.

Subsequent visits to two other churches (at Worksop and Thrybergh), hosting similar gatherings, produced the same responses, and so it was that we decided it was the right decision to start our own 'Soup and Song' events closer to home.

Starting in September last year the sessions have grown from strength to strength, and the Lost Chord singers/musicians and volunteers that have been coming to entertain seem to get as much enjoyment from being there as the people they perform to!

The continued popularity of Soup and Song means our programme for 2025 is now being planned with Lost Chord, and booking in the singers and musicians is being liaised with the very helpful Lynsey who coordinates it with us.

New flyers will be printed in due course, but as long as you put the second Thursday each month from 12 noon to 2 pm on your calendar or diary (and to come with a good appetite for food, singing and fun), you're sure to have a good time that day!

Lost Chord is a charitable organisation that is dedicated and experienced in providing musicians and singers that share songs of yesteryear, which bring back memories to those with dementia, but also the more senior members of our community, whilst uniting all through the power of music. We have even had a few little ones attend and catered for with songs such as "Baby Shark" or "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star" and the older generation join in with these too!

All our Soup and Song gatherings provide not just soup, but also sandwiches, quiches, cake and buns with tea and coffee refreshments all for FREE. To help with some of the food provisions we would like to thank 'The Food Hub' at Kiveton, who have helped support us, and also Greencore, who not only supply us with soups and quiches, but with two employees each time to help serve the food and refreshments. To help get us started we were assisted by RMBC Cllrs: Dominic Beck and Marnie Havard, and to help us continue to provide this facility we would like to express our appreciation to Wales Parish Council for their funding support.

Very recently we have been successful in being accepted by the Co-op community fund as being one of their three chosen projects to be given assisted funding over the next 12 months, which we are extremely excited about.

To help grow the potential contribution Soup and Song can receive from the Co-op we would very much appreciate if all Co-op members would select us to be chosen as the local community project they would like to support, and we thank you all for this in advance.

You can join us on the second Thursday of each month between 12 noon and 2 pm, and the next event is the Christmas one which will be on December 12th. Please come along and join us in the festivities and be sure to wear your Christmas jumpers and any other suitable attire that gives that Christmas feel to it.

There will be one or two additional musical performances to look forward to as well as the Lost Chord entertainer, so don't miss it, please make the effort to bring your Mum, Dad, Grandma or Grandad, and make some new friends along the way. Our local care homes are welcome, and you can be assured of a warm welcome and we guarantee you'll be back for more!










Harthill and Woodall Memories and History Society
